On a Sunday morning, March 2, 1913, a fire consumed our meetinghouse which was constructed in 1883. Everything was destroyed—the loss being about \$10,000.

The story is told that the night was windy and cold (below zero). Mr. W. A. Newton, who lived a block northwest of the church, discovered the fire when he arose early to fix his own furnace. When he arrived the entire basement was in flames. He sounded the fire alarm and several hundred people responded. Unfortunately, in a few hours the wood frame structure was gone with many cherished memories.

Plans were immediately taken for the erection of a new and modern structure. In a short time, the total amount clled for in the contract was pledged. The cornerstone was laid by December 7, 1913, - less than ten months from the date of the fire. In the cornerstone, there is a copper box fifteen inches square. In this box, there is a Bible, a historical sketch of the church, a list of officers and members, reports of building and finance committees, the architects, an issue of the Stark County News, and some Lincoln head pennies.

During the time of construction, members met in McClenahan's Hall until the Christian Church offer to share their church, They were without a pastor and we were without a church. We worshipped together for nearly a year, and were very helpful to one another. Seventeen months from the date of the fire, the church was dedicated on October 15, 1914. It was a stormy night, however 600 people attended the service—with many standing. The Reverend Harry P. Dewey of Minneapolis was the speaker with pastor of the local churches assisting. Miss Irene Nowlan was the organist. Mr. Harry Wrigley, chairman of the building committee, gave a report—the final cost of the building being \$30,000.
